Jason Lazarus Rises at Expo Chicago

The local photographer's exhibit should be your first stop at the art fair

Chicago has seen its share of art fairs come and go, but this month's Expo Chicago, led by former Art Chicago VP Tony Karman, promises a fresh start. More so than its predecessors, Expo makes an effort to highlight local talent while showcasing top-tier international galleries. Among the featured Chicagoans is the photographer Jason Lazarus (pictured at right), a Columbia College grad who first found success in 2006 with a series of self-portraits at the Museum of Contemporary Art.

With Andrew Rafacz Gallery, Lazarus will install *Sarasota Photomat: Lindsey, Teenage-Goth One-Hour Photo Technician, 1997–2000,* an ambitious archive that reveals a new side to his work. In contrast to his self-portraits, *Sarasota* provides a voyeuristic look into the lives of countless strangers who dropped their film off at a Florida photo processor more than a decade ago. The Lindsey of the title is Lazarus's friend—and the employee who pinched the photos. "For me, it's a portrait of Lindsey; for everyone else, it's a portrait of that person who had access to their personal photos," he says. Meanwhile, his archival project *Too Hard to Keep* recently landed at the Philadelphia Photo Art Center and the International Biennial of Photography and Visual Arts in Liège, Belgium.
